Challenging Trip to the Claw

Mark& I, and Jim Loftin took Brandy to a more challenging cave "The Claw." Her first caving trip was Green Valley Cave but she wanted to go through a tougher cave, so off we go. We went through the climb down and then crawled through the low crawlway into a small room. We went through the squeeze and rigged the 17" ft. pit. Jim repelled down first then Brandy, Mark, and I was the last to go down. After we reached the bottom, we went further into the cave. We went through a climb down and squeezed through a little hole, and then we went through another climb down and squeezed through another little hole up a sandy slope. We then had to climb through more passage until we reached the Apricot Slide which is about a 15-20' ft. slide down. We worked our way to a big passage and then into a big room where the register is. We sat and ate lunch, and then proceeded to go back further into the cave. We walked Through more passage then crossed over a 15' ft. pit to the

other side. We crawled over the Crazy Rock (a large rock that tilts back and forth as you crawl across it.) Then we **climbed up a 20' ft. wall which headed** back out a different way to the entrance of the cave. Brandy got stuck through a tight squeeze, but she managed to grunt her way through. Fourth Trip To McDill Point Blow Hole

On Sunday 6-15-03, Mark & I, Jim, and Nick went back to survey McDill Point Blow Hole and take photos of the cave, but everything failed. First of all we **had the wrong survey notes, and Jim's** camera quit working. Nick stayed at the entrance chiseling rock so he can make him self fit through the filter. While Mark & I, and Jim were at the **bottom of the 15" ft. drop exploring the** rest of the cave, Nick, knocked a big chunk of rock off the wall and plugged up the crack where we had to climb back out of to get to entrance. He hammered the rock until it fell. He was then able to fit through the filter . After his third attempt, he finally broke on through to the other side, and repelled down the pit where we were exploring. Nick finally got into the cave he has been wanting to explore. The room in **the cave is about 50' ft. long and 15-20'** ft. wide and in some places the ceiling is about 25-30' ft. high. This cave is also made up of many different kinds of rock. No limestone.
