## **White Nose Syndrome Marches On**

White Nose Syndrome effects continue with the extension of cave closures in Tennessee and new closures in Ohio and Michigan.

The Center for Biological Diversity has initiated lawsuits to sue the Department of Interior for not granting endangered status to bats. They have also petitioned to close all 'bat' caves on Federal,

State, AND private landowner jurisdiction. These are tough times indeed for cavers, as evident by the dearth of trip reports. There are very few caves open, primarily private caves and notably several Indiana Karst Conservancy caves. Even state and federally owned pits that obviously have no bat populations are closed under the blanket closures.

Ellison Cave crossover trip may be same weekend as



#### A Trip to Sullivan Cave by Bill Morrow

I woke up at 5 am Sunday and managed to pour Nick into the car at 5:30am. My goal was to meet Ralph, Todd, and Laura at Sullivan for a day of caving. The day before they had dropped a hard pit, Smith's Blowhole. They suggested that they'd be happy to do a more moderate cave trip at Sullivan with Nick and myself.

Although Nick just turned 9, this was his fourth trip into Sullivan, and I am comfortable with what he can do. We decided to do a circle route, which consisted of taking the Grand Canyon passage to the Popcorn Crawl, dropping down into the Sorry Room and the Sullivan River, and eventually climbing up into the Mountain Room. The Popcorn Crawl is not typical Sullivan passage, in that it actually has speleothems. The Popcorn Crawl is also not what I'd call a great beginners passage, meaning that there actually are some moderately tough spots and featured floor that can rub your elbows raw. The crawl eventually ends in a notably cooler breakdown area in which one eventually

finds a hole dropping down in a pinball style passage into the Sullivan River. Some strategic spotting for Nick, and we were all strolling along the Sullivan River. enjoying the raised water levels and increased volume of discharge. At the junction with the River and the passage leading to the Mountain Room, Ralph experimented with his photography while we just enjoyed the area. I also showed Nick Armstrong's Folly.

Threading our way through the breakdown in the stream leading to the Mountain Room, we climbed up to the Mountain Room and meandered about for awhile before heading back out. The entire trip took about 4 hours, with nobody tired or hurt. It actually felt strange to be changing caving gear in sunny warm weather. Dark and cold had seemed to be the norm for most of us. It was a successful trip with beautiful weather, culminated by a trip to Steak and Shake afterwards.
